For this type of tax, a "parcel" generally means land and buildings that receive a single tax bill for property taxes from the County Tax Collector's Office. The proposed tax would generally apply to all such parcels, except that the Measure allows the District to exempt owners of single-family homes who are 65 or older and who live on the property as their primary residence. The Measure also allows the District to exempt owners of single-family homes who receive Supplemental Security Income for a disability or who receive Social Security Disability Insurance benefits and meet certain income requirements. Anyone who is currently exempt from the expiring tax will automatically qualify for an exemption from this renewal.	
The Board expects the proposed tax to raise roughly \$475,000 each year, although the exact amount may vary. If it is approved by two-thirds of voters, the tax will be in effect for eight years from July 1, 2020 until June 30, 2028.	
When a school district proposes such a tax, which is a type of "special tax," the school district must identify what the tax will be used for, and the funds generated by the tax can only be used for those purposes.
