COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE O

A school district may levy a tax upon approval by two-thirds of the votes cast on a proposal pursuant to section 4 of article XIIIA of the California Constitution and section 50075 *et seq.* of the California Government Code. Subject to voter approval, the Board of Trustees (Board) Cupertino Union School District (District) has placed on the ballot a new \$125 per year school parcel tax to be levied beginning July 1, 2020 for five (5) years from that date, ending June 30, 2025.

State law requires the District to state the specific purposes for which the tax proceeds will be used and only spend the proceeds of the tax for these purposes. The stated purposes of the tax proposed by Measure O are to:

- Retain highly qualified teachers;
- Maintain and protect strong core academic programs in reading, writing, math, engineering, and science;
- Keep schools safe, clean, and maintained;
- Protect art and music programs;
- Ensure teachers have adequate training and support; and
- Keep teacher salaries competitive with surrounding districts.

The District is required by law to provide additional accountability measures for the proceeds. These measures include (1) depositing the proceeds into a fund that is separate and apart from other District funds; and (2) providing an annual written report to the Board detailing the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project authorized to be funded from the tax. The District will establish a citizens' oversight committee, which will provide oversight regarding the expenditure of the proceeds of the proposed tax revenues and submit an annual report to the Board on the expenditure of these funds.

The proposed tax does not apply to any parcel that is a principal residence of, and owned by, one or more persons 65 years of age or older; persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age; or persons receiving Social Security Disability Insurance benefits, regardless of age, whose yearly income does not exceed 250 percent of the 2012 federal poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services upon approval of an application for exemption by the District. The Measure also states that parcels that are contiguous to each other, used solely for owner-

occupied single family residential purposes and held under identical ownership may be treated as a single parcel for purposes of the levy of the school parcel tax upon approval of an application from the owners thereof submitted to the District by June 15, 2020, or June 15 of any succeeding tax year. The Measure states that persons who currently receive an exemption from the District's Measure A parcel tax shall automatically qualify for an exemption from this new measure without needing to file a new application for an exemption.

A "yes" vote is a vote to approve a special tax of \$125 per parcel on parcels within the District for five years.

A "no" vote is a vote to not approve a special tax of \$125 per parcel on parcels within the District for five years.

CUPERTINO UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT School Parcel Tax Measure O

INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

To support academic excellence to retain and attract quality teachers, and to provide local reliable funding for local schools that cannot be taken by the State, with no proceeds used for administrators' salaries, benefits and pensions, the Cupertino Union School District ("District") proposes a school parcel tax for a period of five (5) years, starting on July 1, 2020, at a rate of \$125 per parcel per year, with an exemption available for senior citizens and certain disabled persons, and to implement accountability measures, including citizen oversight, to ensure the funds are used to help:

- Retain highly qualified teachers;
- Maintain and protect strong core academic programs in reading, writing, math, engineering and science;
- Keep schools safe, clean and maintained;
- Protect art and music programs;
- Ensure teachers have adequate training and support; and
- Keep teacher salaries competitive with surrounding districts.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 50075.1, the proceeds of the school parcel tax shall only be applied for the purposes stated above. The proceeds of the parcel tax shall be deposited into a separate account created by the District.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL ANY OF THE PROCEEDS OF THE SCHOOL PARCEL TAX BE USED FOR ADMINISTRATORS' SALARIES, BENEFITS OR PENSIONS.

DEFINITION OF "PARCEL"

For purposes of the parcel tax, the term "Parcel" means any parcel of land which lies wholly or partially within the boundaries of the Cupertino Union School District that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Santa Clara County Assessor. All property that is otherwise exempt from or upon which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the parcel tax in such year.

For purposes of this parcel tax, any such "Parcels" which are (i) contiguous, and (ii) used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes, and (iii) held under identical ownership may, by submitting to the District an application of the owners thereof by June 15 of any year, be treated as a single "parcel" for purposes of the levy of the school parcel tax.

EXEMPTION FOR SENIORS AND SSI RECIPIENTS

Pursuant to California Government Code Section 50079(b)(1), any owner of a Parcel used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes and who are either (a) 65 years of age or older on or before June 30 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the year in which the tax would apply, or (b) persons receiving Supplemental

Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, or (c) receiving Social Security Disability Insurance benefits, regardless of age, whose yearly income does not exceed 250 percent of the 2012 federal poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, may obtain an exemption from the parcel tax by submitting an application therefore, by June 15 of any year, to the District.

Persons who are owners of Parcels used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes and currently exempted from the District's Measure A parcel tax shall automatically be exempted from this Measure without having to file a new application.

The District may establish administrative procedures to periodically verify the continuance of any previously granted exemption.

With respect to all general property tax matters within its jurisdiction, the Santa Clara County Treasurer and Tax Collector or other appropriate county tax officials, shall make all final determinations of tax exemption or relief for any reason, and that decision shall be final and binding. With respect to matters specific to the levy of the school parcel tax, including any exemptions and the classification of property for purposes of calculating the tax, the decisions of the District shall be final and binding.

REDUCTION IN TAX IF RESULT IS LESS OTHER GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

The collection of the parcel tax is not intended to decrease or offset any increase in local, state or federal government revenue sources that would otherwise be available to the District during the period of the parcel tax. In the event that the levy and collection does have such an effect, the District may cease the levy or shall reduce the parcel tax to the extent that such action would restore the amount of the decrease or offset in other revenues that would otherwise occur.

ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

In accordance with the requirements of California Government Code Sections 50075.1 and 50075.3, the following accountability measures, among others, shall apply to the parcel tax levied in accordance with this Measure: (a) the specific purposes of the parcel tax shall be those purposes identified above; (b) the proceeds of the parcel tax shall be applied only to those specific purposes identified above; (c) a separate, special account shall be created into which the proceeds of the parcel tax must be deposited; and (d) an annual written report shall be made to the Board of Education of the District showing (i) the amount of funds collected and expended from the proceeds of the school parcel tax and (ii) the status of any projects or programs required or authorized to be funded from the proceeds of the parcel tax, as identified above; and (e) the District will establish an parcel tax oversight committee to review the expenditure of parcel tax revenues.
