To improve school health and safety systems; fix deteriorating roofs, plumbing, and electrical; remove asbestos/lead pipes; and repair, acquire, construct classrooms, sites, science labs, facilities, equipment, and instructional technology that support student achievement in math, science, engineering, reading, arts and technology, shall Union School District's measure authorizing \$128,000,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying 2¢/\$100 assessed value (\$7,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with independent citizen oversight and all money locally controlled?

COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE R

California law permits school districts to issue bonds with the approval of 55 percent of the voters. Such bonds may only be used for construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities. These bonds are required to be paid by the levy of *ad valorem* taxes—a tax on the assessed value of property within a district.

The Board of Trustees (Board) of the Union School District (District) proposes to issue such bonds in the amount of up to \$128 million for the purposes of improving school health and safety systems; fixing deteriorating roofs, plumbing, and electrical; removing asbestos and lead pipes; and repairing, acquiring, and constructing classrooms, sites, science labs, facilities, equipment, and instructional technology that support student achievement in math, science, engineering, reading, arts and technology.

As identified in the measure, projects may include but are not limited to:

- Repair or replace deteriorating roofs, plumbing, sewer, and electrical systems.
- Upgrade older schools so they meet current health codes, building safety codes, and provide proper access for students with disabilities.
- Remove hazardous materials including asbestos and lead pipes.
- Improve heating, ventilation, insulation, doors, and windows to improve energy efficiency.
- Repair or replace playground equipment, athletic facilities, and physical education facilities.
- Replace aging portable classrooms with modern, permanent classrooms.
- Improve student safety and campus security systems including security fencing, security cameras, emergency communications systems, intruder protection systems, smoke detectors, fire alarms, and sprinklers.
- Provide the classrooms, facilities and technology needed to support high quality instruction in math, science, engineering, and technology as well as art and music.

Project costs include the costs of furnishing and equipping facilities, and all costs that are incidental, but directly related, to the types of projects described in the measure.

The Board has certified that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs in developing its project list.

COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE R-Continued

Under the California Constitution, these bond funds cannot be used for teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses. The District also must conduct independent annual performance and financial audits. State law requires the District to have an independent citizens' oversight committee to help make sure bond funds are spent only for projects included in the measure.

The District's stated best estimate of the highest tax rate to be levied to repay the proposed bonds is \$20 per \$100,000 of assessed value. The District estimates that the total debt service during the life of the bond, including principal and interest, will be approximately \$240,412,475.

Measure R was placed on the ballot by the Board.

A "yes" vote is a vote to authorize the issuance of the bonds in the amount of up to \$128 million to be secured by the levy of *ad valorem* taxes on property located within the District.

A "no" vote is a vote to not authorize the issuance of the bonds.

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters of the Union School District.

"To improve school health and safety systems; fix deteriorating roofs, plumbing, and electrical; remove asbestos/lead pipes; and repair, acquire, construct classrooms, sites, science labs, facilities, equipment, and instructional technology that support student achievement in math, science, engineering, reading, arts and technology, shall Union School District's measure authorizing \$128,000,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying 2ϕ /\$100 assessed value (\$7,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with independent citizen oversight and all money locally controlled?"

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees of the Union School District is committed to providing safe, secure, upgraded classrooms, labs and technology needed to support high quality instruction **in math**, **science**, **engineering and technology**. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical technology and facility needs, including safety issues, class size reduction, **basic repairs**, computer and information technology in developing the types of projects to be funded by this measure as described below.

In approving this Project List, the Board of Trustees determines that the District **must**:

- (i) Fix deteriorating roofs, plumbing, sewer and electrical systems; and
- (ii) Upgrade older schools so they meet current health codes, building safety codes and provide proper access for students with disabilities; and
- (iii) Remove hazardous materials, like asbestos and lead pipes from older schools; and
- Provide classrooms, facilities and technology to support high quality instruction in math, science, engineering and technology; and
- (iv) Upgrade classrooms and computer systems to keep pace with technology.

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at schools, facilities and sites within the District:

Goals and Purposes:

Many of our schools and school facilities were built more than 50 years ago and do not meet modern building safety codes. Some buildings have

hazardous materials such as asbestos and lead pipes, while others need to be retrofitted for earthquake safety.

There are 36 portable classrooms at our schools that are at least 20 years old and require major repairs to roofs, foundations, and heating and ventilation units. It's expensive to keep repairing these units. We need this bond to replace our aging portables with modern, permanent classrooms.

This measure will ensure that students who plan to go to college are prepared to succeed, and those who don't plan to go to college receive the career training they need to compete for good paying jobs in skilled trades.

- Provide the classrooms and facilities needed to support high quality instruction in art and music.

In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the District's existing schools and facilities, may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: add or renovate student and staff restrooms; repair and replace electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies; repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, floors, doors and drinking fountains; construct or renovate offices and facilities for professional development of teachers, more efficient administration and multi-purpose learning spaces and libraries; install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices; upgrade or construct support facilities including administrative, physical education, music, art, performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, maker space/science, computer labs/classrooms, libraries and buildings, swing space, covered eating areas, shade structures; repair and replace fire alarms, emergency communications and security systems; improve facilities to satisfy ADA requirements; resurface or replace asphalt, broken concrete and improve hard courts, turf and irrigation/drainage systems; install signage, and fencing; expand parking and drop-off areas; improve all site utilities; acquire land; construct new school buildings; upgrade or replace interior and exterior painting, floor covering (including carpets), portable classrooms and school facades; demolition; upgrade kitchens, food service, and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve outdoor learning environments; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems; construct, acquire or improve playgrounds, play structures, athletic fields, tracks and facilities to support student health, fitness and safety, and other facilities serving District students; replace outdated security fences and security systems (including access control systems), provide lunch shelters, upgrade music and art classrooms, multi-purpose rooms, learning centers; add or upgrade parking lots. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects.

The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, network rewiring, cabling, computers, mobile interface devices, data centers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, public address systems, laser printers, digital white boards, document projectors, upgrade voice-over-IP, clock/telephone/intercom systems, call manager and IT security, wireless technology systems, refresh classroom technology, acquire necessary software and miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, data storage, phones, identity cards and the

construction and installation of a data center in the cloud for the District enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more costeffective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary on-site and off-site improvements, site preparation and restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, traffic signals, sewer or utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, road widening, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, permits or rights of way to the property. The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, legal fees and similar planning costs, connection fees, permit fees, program/project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the types of projects and purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: THIS MEASURE REQUIRES A CLEAR SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTABILITY, INCLUDING A PROJECT LIST DETAILING HOW THE MONEY WILL BE USED, A CITIZEN'S OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE, AND INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ENSURE MONEY IS SPENT PROPERLY.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15272. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES WILL APPOINT A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND CONDUCT ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ASSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT ONLY ON DISTRICT PROJECTS AND FOR NO OTHER PURPOSE. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT ACCOUNTABILITY FINANCIAL REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW. PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

<u>NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES</u>: PROCEEDS FROM THE SALE OF THE BONDS AUTHORIZED BY THIS PROPOSITION SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION,

RECONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, OR REPLACEMENT OF SCHOOL FACILITIES, INCLUDING THE FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING OF SCHOOL FACILITIES, AND NOT FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSE, INCLUDING TEACHER AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES AND OTHER OPERATING EXPENSES.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

An election will be held in the Union School District (the "District") on November 8, 2022, to authorize the sale of up to \$128,000,000 in bonds of the District to finance school facilities as described in the proposition. If the bonds are approved, the District expects to issue the bonds in multiple series over time. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400 through 9405 of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 2 cents per \$100 (\$20 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax to be levied to fund this bond issue is anticipated to be collected is fiscal year 2058-59.

2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 2 cents per \$100 (\$20 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2023-24.

3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all of the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$240,412,475.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rate is based on the ASSESSED VALUE of taxable property on the County of Santa Clara official tax rolls, not on the property's market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The actual tax rates, debt service and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.
