COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE V

A school district may levy a qualified special tax upon approval by twothirds of the votes cast on a measure pursuant to article XIIIA, section 4 of the California Constitution and California Government Code section 50079. The Board of Trustees (Board) of the Union Elementary School District (District) has placed on the ballot a measure to replace an existing \$96 per year parcel tax, which is set to expire on June 30, 2026, with a \$148 per year parcel tax. If approved by the voters, the tax would begin on July 1, 2026 and continue for seven (7) years.

State law requires such measures state the specific purposes for which tax proceeds will be used and spend the proceeds only for these purposes. The stated purposes of the tax proposed by Measure V are to:

- Attract and retain high-quality teachers;
- Provide high-quality reading and writing programs;
- Provide high-quality programs in science, technology, engineering, and math;
- Maintain manageable class sizes; and
- Provide academic intervention for students who need additional support.

The Measure states that tax proceeds shall not be used for administrators' salaries, benefits, or pensions. Pursuant to State law, the Measure provides additional accountability measures for the proceeds, including (1) depositing the proceeds into a fund separate from other District funds, and (2) providing an annual written report to the Board detailing the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded from the tax. The Measure also states that the Board will maintain its existing citizens' oversight committee to provide oversight as to the expenditure of the tax revenues.

The Measure provides that, for purposes of the levy of this tax, any parcels that are (1) contiguous; (2) used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes; and (3) held under identical ownership may, by the owners of such parcels submitting an application to the District by June 15 of any year, be treated as a single parcel. The Measure states that the proposed tax does not apply to property that is otherwise exempt from taxation, or on which no property taxes are levied that year.

According to the Measure, any owner of a parcel used solely for owneroccupied, single-family residential purposes who is (1) 65 years of age or older as of June 30 of the preceding fiscal year; (2) receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age; or (3) receiving Social Security Disability Insurance benefits, regardless of age,

and whose yearly income does not exceed 250 percent of the 2012 federal poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, may obtain an exemption from the proposed tax by submitting an application to the District before June 15 of any year. Per the Measure, persons currently exempt from the District's expiring parcel tax shall automatically be exempted from the proposed tax without need to reapply.

A "yes" vote is a vote to replace an existing parcel tax with an increased tax of \$148 per parcel on parcels within the District for seven years, beginning on July 1, 2026.

A "no" vote is a vote to not renew the tax.

UNION ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT Quality Education and Local Control Funding Measure V

INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

To continue funding for core programs in science, technology, engineering and math, provide local reliable funding for local schools that cannot be taken away by the State, attract and retain high-quality teachers, provide high quality reading and writing programs, maintain manageable class sizes, provide academic intervention for students who need additional support, preserve high quality programs in art, music and performing arts, and continue funding for counselors and mental health support, with no proceeds used for administrators' salaries, benefits and pensions, the Union Elementary School District ("District") proposes to replace its existing education and local control parcel tax for a period of seven years from its current expiration date (June 30, 2026), starting on July 1, 2026 at a rate of \$148 per parcel per year, with an exemption available for senior citizens and certain disabled persons, and to implement accountability measures, including citizen oversight, to ensure the funds are used to help:

- Attract and retain high-quality teachers;
- Provide high quality reading, and writing programs;
- Provide high quality programs in science, technology, engineering and math;
- Maintain manageable class sizes;
- Provide academic intervention for students who need additional support.

The proceeds of the parcel tax shall be deposited into a separate account created by the District.

DEFINITION OF "PARCEL"

For purposes of the high quality education parcel tax, the term "Parcel" means any parcel of land which lies wholly or partially within the boundaries of the Union Elementary School District, that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Santa Clara County Assessor/Tax Collector, as applicable. All property that is otherwise exempt from or upon which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the education and local control parcel tax in such year.

For purposes of this education and local control parcel tax, any such "Parcels" which are (i) contiguous, and (ii) used solely for owneroccupied, single-family residential purposes, and (iii) held under identical ownership may, by submitting to the District an application of the owners thereof by June 15 of any year, be treated as a single "parcel" for purposes of the levy of the high quality education and local control parcel tax.

EXEMPTION FOR SENIORS AND SSI RECIPIENTS

Pursuant to California Government Code Section 50079 (b)(1), any owner of a Parcel used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes and who are either (a) 65 years of age or older on or before June 30 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the year in which

the tax would apply, or (b) persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, or (c) receiving Social Security Disability Insurance benefits, regardless of age, whose yearly income does not exceed 250 percent of the 2012 federal poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, may obtain an exemption from the parcel tax by submitting an application therefore, by June 15 of any year, to the District.

Persons who are owners of Parcels used solely for owneroccupied, single-family residential purposes and currently exempted from the District's expiring Measure B parcel tax shall automatically be exempted from this Measure without having to file a new application.

The District may establish administrative procedures to periodically verify the continuance of any previously granted exemption.

With respect to all general property tax matters within its jurisdiction, the Santa Clara County Treasurer and Tax Collector or other appropriate county tax officials, shall make all final determinations of tax exemption or relief for any reason, and that decision shall be final and binding. With respect to matters specific to the levy of the high quality education and local control parcel tax, including any exemptions and the classification of property for purposes of calculating the tax, the decisions of the District shall be final and binding.

REDUCTION IN TAX IF RESULT IS LESS OTHER GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

The collection of the education and local control parcel tax is not intended to decrease or offset any increase in local, state or federal government revenue sources that would otherwise be available to the District during the period of the parcel tax. In the event that the levy and collection does have such an effect, the District may cease the levy or shall reduce the parcel tax to the extent that such action would restore the amount of the decrease or offset in other revenues.

ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

In accordance with the requirements of California Government Code Sections 50075.1 and 50075.3, the following accountability measures, among others, shall apply to the parcel tax levied in accordance with this Measure: (a) the specific purposes of the parcel tax shall be those purposes identified above; (b) the proceeds of the parcel tax shall be applied only to those specific purposes identified above; (c) a separate, special account shall be created into which the proceeds of the education and local control parcel tax must be deposited; and (d) an annual written report shall be made to the Board of Education of the District showing (i) the amount of funds collected and expended from the proceeds of the high guality education and local control parcel tax and (ii) the status of any projects or programs required or authorized to be funded from the proceeds of the parcel tax, as identified above. In addition to the accountability measures required by law, the District will maintain its existing Citizens' Oversight Committee to provide oversight as to the expenditure of parcel tax revenues.
